Dear CPC Family:

It was a few days shy of Labor Day when ads appeared enticing us with luxurious pumpkin spice lattes as a reward for all the back-to-school sales. Remember them?

Pumpkin in August and September? There was a time when “pumpkin” did not cross the lips until mid-October. Yet September flooded Facebook and other media outlets with



yummy pumpkin bread recipes, pumpkin nut brownies, pumpkin pudding, tangy pumpkin cider. Jazzed up pumpkin cheesecake pie. Even in the supermarket one can find pumpkin yoghurt, pumpkin dog treats, pumpkin double-stuffed Oreos, and pumpkin ice cream. Animals paraded to their eternal embarrassment wearing pumpkin helmets. Exquisite pumpkin carvings. Pumpkin catapulting contests. The lure of the world’s delights would pull away to think of the holidays before us and not the glories of moment. Sure there are anxieties lying ahead in the future, as well as today. However, our Lord advises that we give our attention to the now and dealing faithfully and compassionately with the problems of the day. Only by doing so, do we gain the grace, day by day, to face the challenges of tomorrow.

So now that it is October, I am ready for a Pumpkin spice latte. Yes, I refuse to look at those Christmas cookies on the shelf at the drugstore. It’s not time. This month I am looking forward to a week of continuing



education from Oct. 12-20. I will be traveling with the mission group from Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in Manhattan to the ministry "Frontera de Cristo" near the border of Arizona and Mexico. It's time to see how our brothers and sisters on both sides of the border engage ministry together. Please pray for a safe trip, and I look forward to sharing with you the experience upon my return.

So, give thanks to God for the delights and wonders of this season. What a wonderful message to learn and live.

Once in a while, our four-legged friends need help, too!



OCT. 6 is **WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY**, and we will again be participating in the **PEACE AND GLOBAL WITNESS SPECIAL OFFERING**.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering encourages the church to cast off anxiety and fear, discord and division, and embrace our reconciling God's mission to those around the corner and around the world..... **confronting hopelessness, thwarting division and empowering congregations and individuals to become peacemakers themselves.**

It draws Presbyterians together, and provides education and exposure to those who show us how to do peacemaking well.

A gift to the Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize up to 25% of this Offering to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace. Mid councils retain an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

The 2019 Peace and Global Witness theme is "Peace at all times in all ways."

(2 Thessalonians 3:16)

The second letter to the Thessalonians was written on the same theme as the first: the imminent return of Jesus, and the triumphal resolution of God's plan for all creation. The need for a second letter, though, arose from growing uneasiness, frustration, and fear within the church from those who thought this was supposed to have happened already. God's time was not the Thessalonian's time. As a result, fear and hopelessness gripped the church, resulting in division, mistrust, and dismay that began to zap the church of its vibrant ministry. Paul writes to encourage their continued faith

and sure hope. In the midst of divisions and discord, he claims a God of peace who can bring peace at all times, in all ways.

REFORMATION SUNDAY

Oct. 27, 2019

On Halloween of 1517, a German monk named Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the door of Wittenberg Church. These 95 Theses expressed his concerns over corruption found in the Catholic church. One of his primary concerns was the church selling “indulgences” to people in order to release them from having to serve penitence for their sins. An act which he considered to be people trying to buy their way into heaven. This act opened up a debate with religious scholars of the time that eventually lead to the Protestant Reformation.

Reformation Day has been observed as a holiday since the mid-16th century, but its official date of October 31st was set until about 1717. This is when it became an official German observance and the date from which it would spread on an international level.

The Presbyterian Church celebrates Reformation Sunday on the last Sunday of October, commemorating a significant event in the history of the Reformed tradition and giving Presbyterians an opportunity to celebrate our heritage and history, to affirm our central theological convictions and to consider God's ongoing reformation of the church.

This is how they see it working:

3) And since this is NOT a garage sale, and we will be advertising the sale to actual collectors and antique houses, we ask that all tables be covered with table cloths. (Sheets make excellent table cloths.)

4) Commitment table forms will be circulated a few months before the event, and we will need a firm, non-refundable commitment from you as it will be on a first-come-first-served basis. (Checks will be made payable to "Community Presbyterian Church with 'Estate Sale' on the memo line.)

5) You may return your commitment form to one of our deacons or to Barbara in the office.
