A Word From the Desk of Pastor Moira

For behold, the winter is past; the rain is over and gone. The flowers appear on the earth, the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land. Song of Songs 2: 11-12"

Dear CPC Family:

The poet, T.S. Elliot, in his poem, "the Waste Land" wrote: "April is the cruelest month, breeding lilacs out of the dead land, mixing memory and desire, stirring dull roots with spring rain." Elliot was quoting the opening lines of 14th Century poet, Geoffrey Chauncer's "The Canterbury Tales." For a long time, April has been considered an unusual month. We begin the month with April Fool's Day, we pay our annual taxes on April 15, and proclaim our care for the world on Earth Day (April 22). Often in April, we observe Holy Week and celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord.

Why is April considered so cruel by the poets? April is a month of transition, from the frigid cold and bare branches and drabness of winter, to the blooming of flowers, the nourishing rains, the return and increased activity of birds. Hibernating animals are starting to emerge. These are all wonderful things. But the poets and the events of Holy Week remind us that new life emerges from the realms of death and pain. It is unavoidable. The process of new growth can hurt. Think of

those tiny shoots pushing through the earth, of caterpillars breaking through a cocoon, or a baby bird breaking through a shell. Any woman who has given birth can tell you in intimate, blow-by blow details, how it was.

So it is with faith. Our life of faith is not







strenuous la

static. It goes underground. It encounters painful transitions as we seek to follow Jesus. Consider the disciples. How much did they misunderstand? How many mistakes did they make? How many false judgments did they profess? How many fled from pain and danger? Yet each act of failure, each step they took alongside Jesus (in spite of their many errors) led them further to growth. Each step was a peck in the shell. Eventually they began to break free to faith in the Resurrected One who led them on a new journey of faith. Even Jesus, on his journey, emerged from the tomb bearing the scars of his suffering. It is a reminder to us that our scars are not sources of shame but of potential transformation if we let it be so. So this is a never-ending journey, this side of eternity, as we handle the discomfort and joy of growth. The letting go, working through the pain, in order to grow into deeper abilities to love, accept, and serve, in his holy name.

April means "to open." What will open up in us this month, as we pass through the final weeks of Lent, into Holy Week, and then onto Easter?

Complete reading the book, "Crazy Christians," by Bishop Michael Curry, book discussion later in April. Come to our final Lenten worship series on

Wednesday, April 6, 7:00pm, at Seaford United Methodist Church, as we reflect on the song, "At the Cross." We continue meet for Bible Study on Wednesdays at noon, on zoom. We will be studying the events before Jesus' death and his passion. Join in on the Palm Sunday on April 10; there will be an easter egg hunt afterwards! (continues on next page)

Please consider signing up! Thank you.





Palm Sunday - March 10



Passion / Palm Sunday begins Holy Week, a time in the church year when we remember how Christ gave his life in love for the world. As this service opens, the crowd waves palm branches,

wanting to crown Jesus as king, shouting "Hosanna, Hosanna". But as the story of the passion unfolds, their shouts of praise turn to demands for his crucifixion; he receives a crown of thorns as he is handed over to be mocked and killed.


On this day palms are received, and we participate in the One Great Hour of Sharing offering, "You Shall Be Called Repairers of The Breach". (Isaiah 58.)

Around the world, millions of people lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education, and opportunity. The three programs supported by One Great Hour of Sharing – Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People – all work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope.

Before preparing the garden soil for this year's

vegetable plantings, we reflect back upon the past year.

Most importantly, prayers of thanks go to



our church family, for their contributions including their time and their labors, in on-going maintaining, repairing, and even restoring anew areas of our church building (as the Sunday School Room and Barker Hall's new floor, ceiling, and walls restored like new and painted) and the many tasks to maintain and improve the grounds.

Despite the many challenges of 2021, it was a productive season producing amazing yields of tomatoes large and small, cukes, peppers, summer squash, lettuce, and potatoes.

Sincere and numerous thank yous go to all the volunteers who made many trips, delivering our harvests of veggies to the Freeport Food Pantry.

Also, we give thanks to Aidan Walley and Scout Troop 225 for six new planting frames, and for donations of tomato cages, a composter, organic soil and fertilizer. And all the future compost. Thanks God.

We are planning to grow more in 2022, and welcome all helping hands. Last year all the veggies were 'donated' by the Boy Scouts as part of Scout Aidan Walley's Eagle Scout Project. THIS YEAR we have to foot the bill ourselves for all the plants! Ouch!

We are also looking for donations of: Tomato stakes and cages, garden hoses and/or soaker hoses, lawn rakes, long-handled tools, Miracle Grow for veggies, and 2 wall-mounts for the hoses.

We'll also accept donations of leftover fertilizer. veggie plant food, and garden waterers! I can't always find the time daily to water the garden, and sometimes in the heat of summer it desperately

needs it. Please consider the donation of one hour of your time to occasionally water the garden. Please call me if you 'd like to help!

Please remember the 'Garden of Eatin' donation jar in the back of the Sanctuary each Sunday.

For those of you who haven't seen it, take a gander below. It's absolutely stunning!



And as of this writing, we in the process of planning a THREE-SEASON GARDEN under and around the sign, and we are asking if YOU'D like to donate a full-sun perennial or two from your own garden! Drought resistant would be icing on the cake!

We are hoping to choose a 'garden planting day' in early May when everyone could bring down the plants they are donating. Scott, Mona, and Barbara will be replanting your plants. We'll let you know what day is finally chosen....

In the meantime, please let the office know what plant(s) you anticipate donating to the garden and how many so the plans can be sketched and prepared.

Thank you in advance, and if you have any questions, please give the office a call.

Here are a few suggestions of Full-sun, droughtresistant perennials:

Bee blossom (Monarda) early summer-fall Black Eyed Susans (June Thru October) Calamintha (early summer to fall)

Candytuft (April and May)

Daylily (1-5 weeks, start early spring)

Dianthus (blooms all summer)

Echinacea (mid July thru September)

Geraniums (blooms early spring thru fall depending on variety)

Goblin Gaillardia (early summer into fall)

Hyssop (summer thru early fall)

Lavender (May – July)

Phlox (summer)

Sage (June – Sept.)

Sedum (summer)

Orange Glory flower (not Morning Glories) – (summer)

As you know, the week after I was installed, I spoke to the congregation and welcomed them ALL to the Property Commission. The reason for that is in our own way, we are ALL part of Property and can all help.

I am asking that from this point forward, please don't bring anything to or leave anything up at church unless someone from Property is aware of it or someone like Mona if she decides to do a Church sale. (During one of my walk-throughs to get acquainted with the building areas, I came upon five snow shovels and 4 vacuum cleaners.) As much as they are appreciated, and as grateful as we are for the donations, we don't need five shovels or four vacuum cleaners. I'm thinking some other organizations might have benefitted from these donations...

If and when the Church is in need of something for Property, we will ask the congregation first and if we have no takers, I will then ask Session to appropriate funds to purchase the needed item(s).

Property projects coming up:

- 1. Replacing the six Grafing Hall ceiling light fixtures with LEDs.
- 2. Replacing the parking light pole light fixture with LED.
- 3. Building several storage closets downstairs for our Sunday School and our tenants.
- 4. A spring clean-up is in the works to remove old wood ladders and debris from around the outside of the Church
- 5. Get estimates for tree removals and outdoor property clean up.
- 6. Beautifying the outdoors with new shrubbery/plants (as mentioned in an earlier article) and a lot of pruning.

I want to thank you all in advance for your cooperation and help. This Church building is as important to me as my own home, and I know you feel the same way.

Let's work together on Property and see what we can accomplish! Thank you and God bless.
