But now, this is what the LORD says-- he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine. Isaiah 43:1

Dear Church Family and Friends:

Rush hour on the Long Island Expressway (LIE) is your typical bumper-to-bumper grind. Unhappy motorists inch along, scowl at vehicles that snake in and out of lanes, lay on the horn at the cheeky SUVs that muscle their way ahead of the line, with not even the courtesy of a blinker. I had settled in the far-left lane. At the rate I was going, I wouldn't reach my destination for at least 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

It turns out I didn't reach it at all.

I accelerated as the car ahead of me moved. Then my car stopped. I mean stopped. No cough, cough, phizzzzzzzzz. It was "good night, folks," the curtains were drawn, and a red battery volt light to tell me something very, very bad had just happened. Fortunately, in heavy rush hour on the LIE, ten miles an hour is speeding. So, I wasn't in immediate danger of being hit. However, the pileup effect was instantaneous. A serenade of horns and disgruntled faces greeted me as I sat there, stuck in the far-left lane, blocking traffic.



As I called 911, a police cruiser came from behind. The policeman gave me instructions. "Put the car in neutral." OK. Next, he gave a big push. Over his bullhorn, instructions were repeated, "Now steer to the right!"

Steer to the right? You mean go right into all that moving traffic? Trust they will stop in time so I can make it to the right shoulder? However, I had no choice. I had to trust.

So I crossed three lanes of flowing traffic and watched helplessly as cars veered helterskelter. Time slowed down. I could see every startled and panicked face that swerved out of my way. Yet I made it finally to the shoulder and to safety. If I weren't so terrified and trembling, I would have jumped out and kissed the guardrail. I eventually got towed to my mechanic. Although I missed my appointment, that is nothing compared to the realization that no one was hurt, there's no scratch on the car, and everyone eventually got home safe and sound.

As I thought about this incident, it occurred to me that at one time or another, we have had "the stalled in the fast lane" situation. We go happily along juggling five or six projects, existing on emotional steam it seems. Sooner or later, something gives. It can be a health problem. An emotional or mental crisis. Maybe a spiritual awakening. Or perhaps something changes at work, or our relationships are not responding like they used to. The bottom line is that the electrical wiring which charges our life and gives us purpose and energy gives out. It just stops.

The kicker is, to get to safety we have to cross all that ongoing traffic. There's no other way to the shoulder. We have to trust that a way will be made. It's called radical trust. God called Abram and Sarai (Gen. 12) out in their old age promising them a child, a land and to make them a nation. God promised to deliver the people of Israel out of slavery (Ex. 3). God promised David a throne and kingdom that would last forever (2 Sam. 7). Responding to God's call takes trust, reorientation of our lives and time. Plenty of time. This is because our lives need to be rewired to the blessing and hope God wants to place in our hearts.

As we prepare for a new season at church, and we actively engage the process of revitalization of our hearts and our congregation, we find ourselves "stuck in the fast lane." We are stalled. We find ourselves needing to be moved to a better place. We encounter the fear of unknown

collisions on the path ahead of us. Behind us, however, the Holy Spirit, is telling us to move. Don't you feel the Spirit pushing us? We need to trust Jesus, the Divine Mechanic, to rewire us and get us moving again in the right direction.



Let our new motto for the rest of 2022 be the old beloved phrase: "Jesus, take the wheel!"

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PEACE – SEPT. 21



The International Day of Peace (or World Peace Day) is celebrated annually on Sept. 21 and is devoted to strengthening the ideals of peace, both within and among all nations and

peoples. At a time when war and violence often monopolize our news cycles, the International Day of

Peace is an inspiring reminder of what we can create

together. Peace. Let's give it a chance!

In 1981, the United Nations General Assembly declared the third Tuesday of September as International Day of Peace. This day coincided with the opening day of the annual sessions of the General Assembly. The purpose of the day was and still remains, to strengthen the ideals of peace around the world.

Two decades after establishing this day of observance, in 2001, the assembly moved the date to be observed annually on September 21. So, beginning in 2002, September 21 marks not only a time to discuss how to promote and maintain peace among all peoples but also a 24-hour period of global ceasefire and nonviolence for groups in active combat.

Peace is possible. Throughout history, most societies have lived in peace most of the time. Today, we are much less likely to die in war than our parents or grandparents. Since the establishment of the United Nations and the creation of the Charter of the United Nations, governments are obligated not to use force against others unless they are acting in self-defense or have been authorized by the UN Security Council to proceed.

Life is better in a world where peace exists and, today, we look to those who have been peacemakers and peacekeepers to learn what we can each do individually to make the world a more peaceful place.

TRADITIONS OF THE DAY BY THE NUMBERS

The International Day of Peace was established by the United Nations General Assembly for strengthening the standards of peace. The day is devoted to observing 24 hours of cease-fire and non-violence.

It is more important than ever today to promote peace and open-mindedness for acceptance across gender, race, and territories. Individuals and organizations around the world participate in activities and host events centered on a set theme for the year. Activities vary from private events to public ceremonies, festivals, and concerts sending the message of peace to large audiences.

Educational institutes also take the lead, arranging art exhibitions and lessons for students to discuss how different cultures celebrate peace and to learn about conflict and wars in history so that mistakes are not repeated. On an individual level, people take part in activities like planting trees or setting caged animals free, as every little act helps in spreading the message of peace and love. **\$13.6 trillion** – the economic cost of violence in 2015. **9,800** – the number of terrorism websites containing violent material by September 2015.

13% – the percentage of women negotiators between 1992 and 2019.

6% – the percentage of women signatories in major peace processes worldwide between 1992 and 2019.

11% – the percentage of ceasefire agreements between2015 and 2019, which included gender provisions.

15.9 million – the estimated number of people in Yemen's population hit by the world's worst food crisis.

135 million – the number of people in 2019 living with acute hunger.

60% – the percentage of people struck with acute hunger living in conflict countries.

88 – the number of countries that had national action plans on women, peace, and security by October 2020.
417 – the number of policy measures enacted by national governments in response to the COVID-19 crisis.

408 million – the estimated number of youth living in areas of armed conflict in 2016.

WHAT CAN WE DO?

1. Observe the global "Minute of Silence"

In 1984, the Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) Pathways to Peace inaugurated the Minute of Silence. At noon in each time zone, this observance of silence creates a "Peace Wave" around the world. Individuals, organizations, communities, and nations are invited to participate in this shared and practical act of peacebuilding.

2. Host a global peace feast

Bring people together with a 'global' potluck, encouraging your friends and neighbors to share a

unique dish from various countries or cultures. Breaking bread together is one of the oldest yet most effective ways to bring peace into your life. Interfaith and intercultural discussions can make the evening even richer.

3. Foster peace through education

Let peace begin at home with you and your family. Teach your children key concepts that promote peace such as conflict-resolution, peaceful dialogue, consensus-building, and the choice of non-violence. <u>https://nationaltoday.com/</u>
